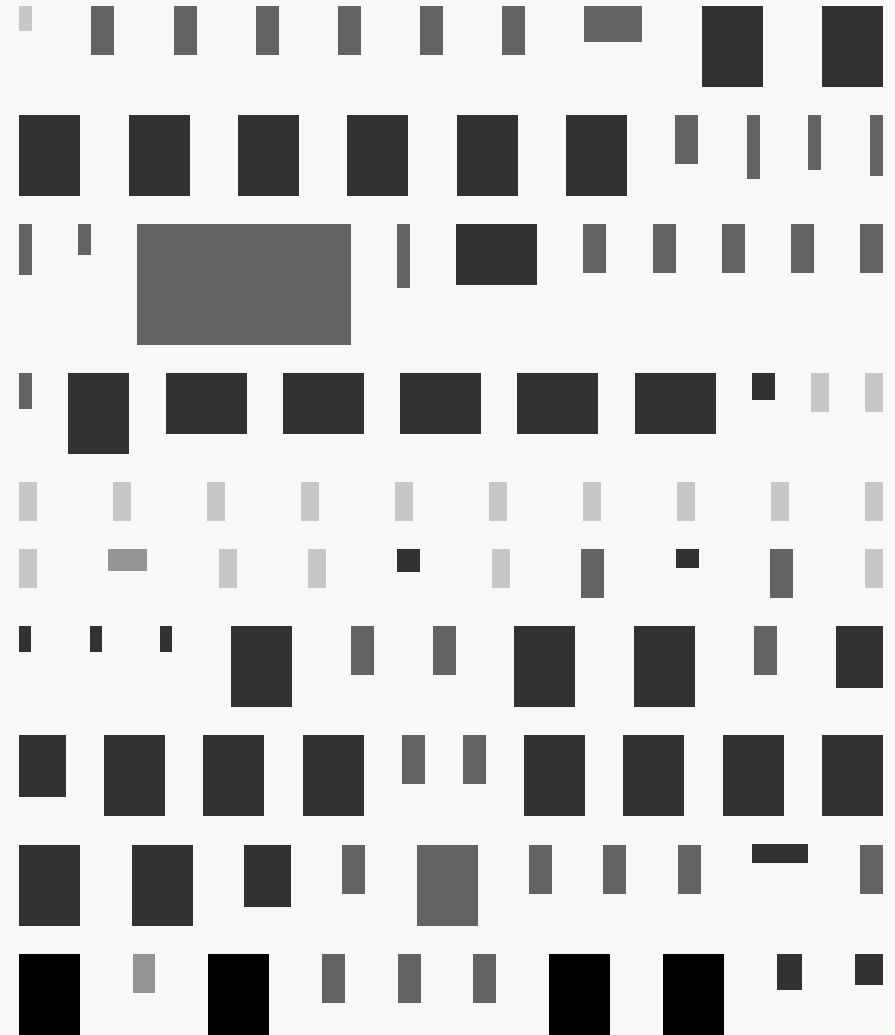

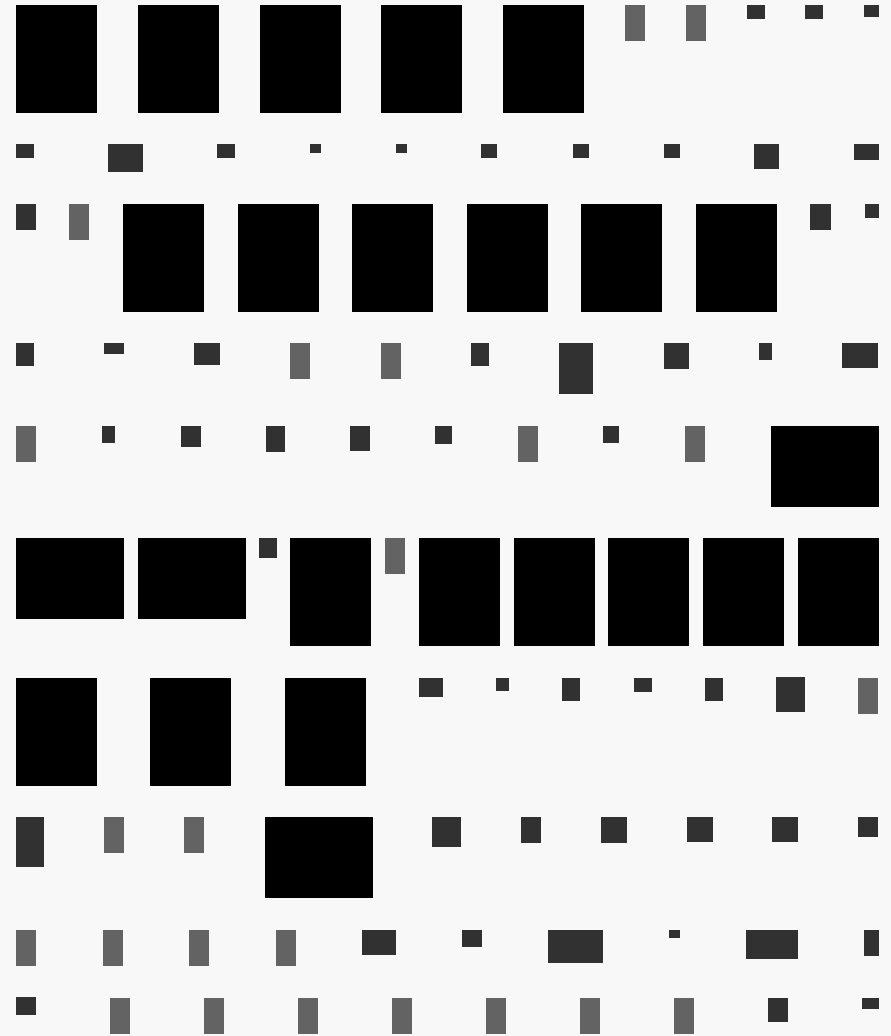
Name

Carly

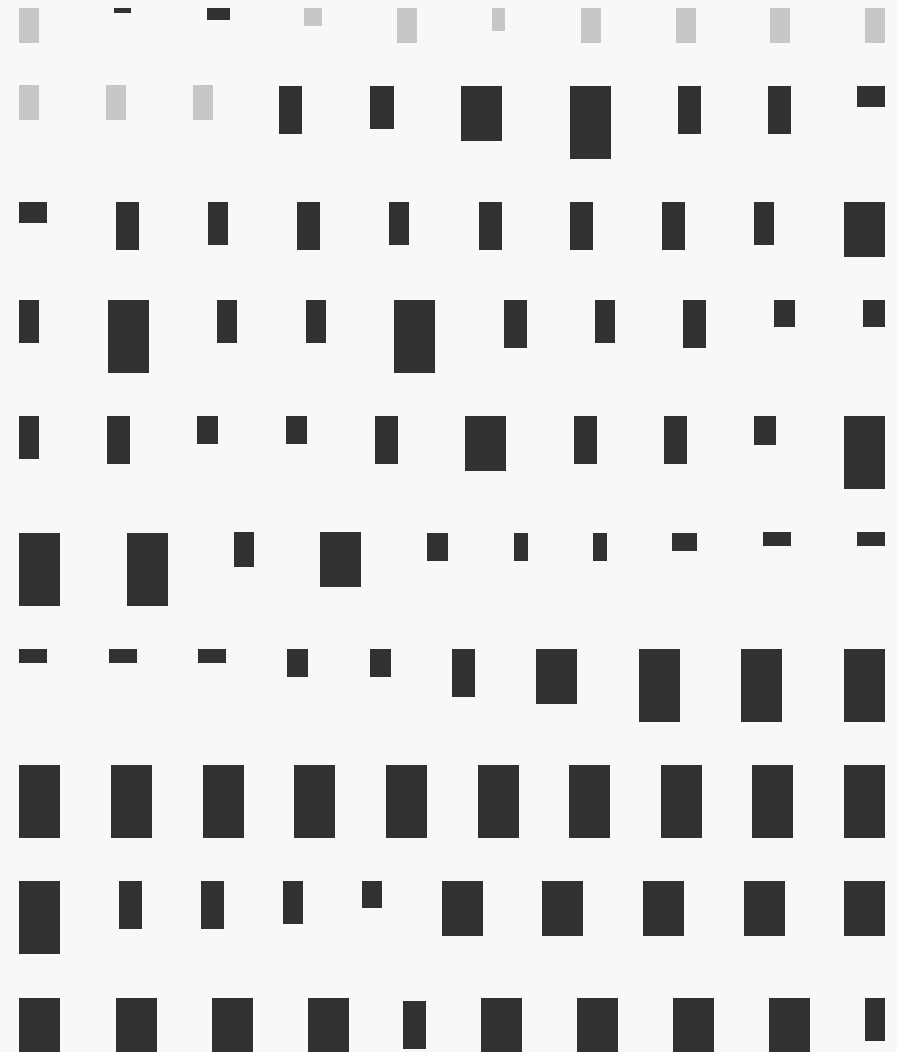

Tara

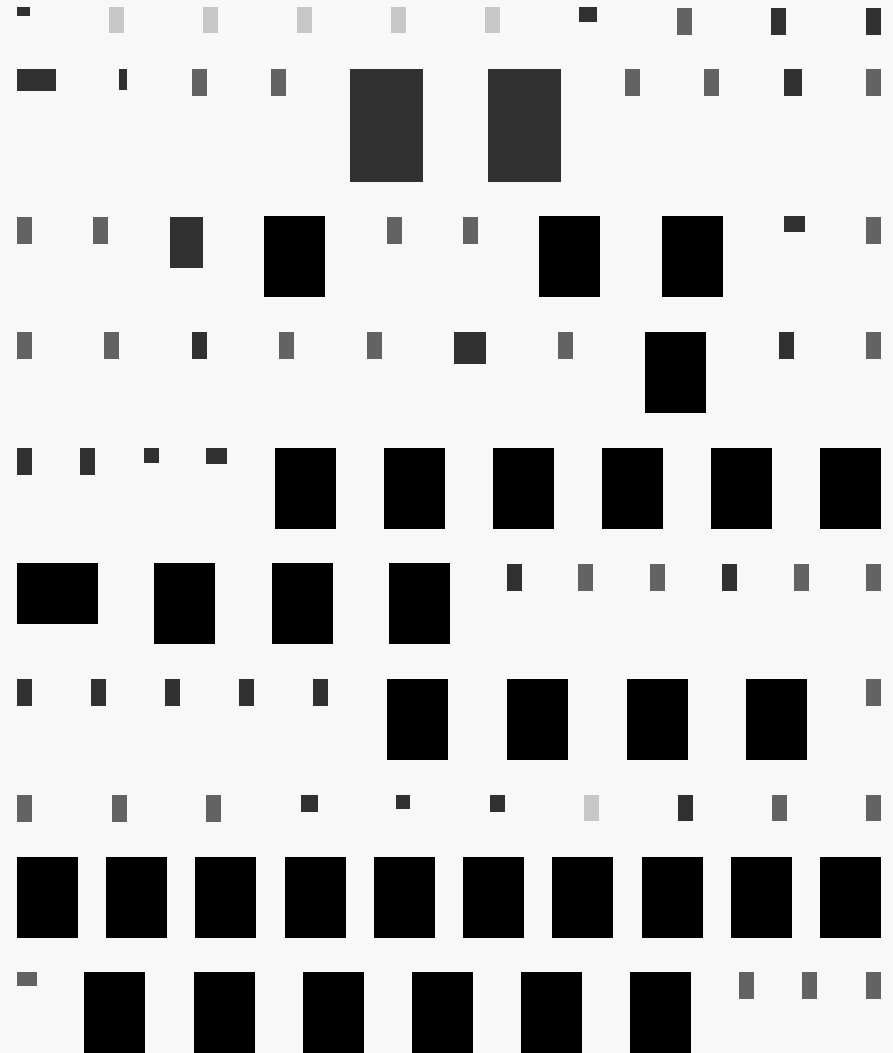

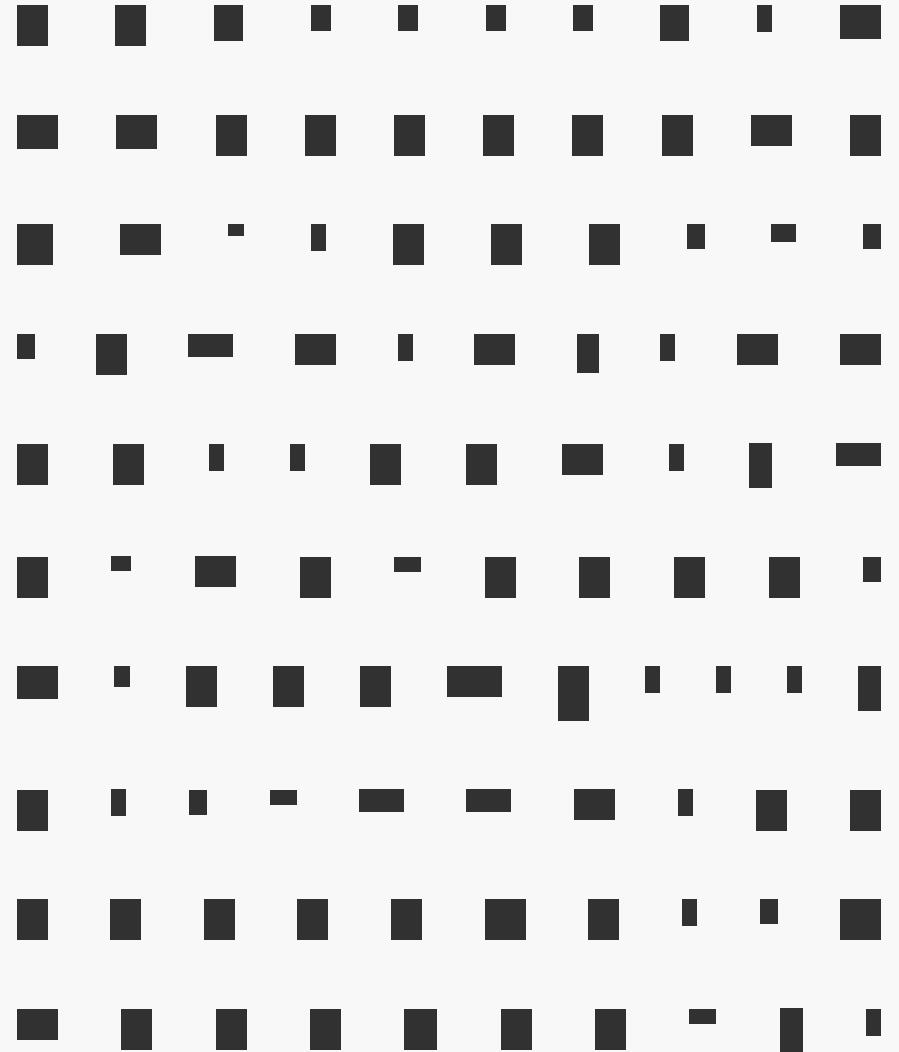

Adele

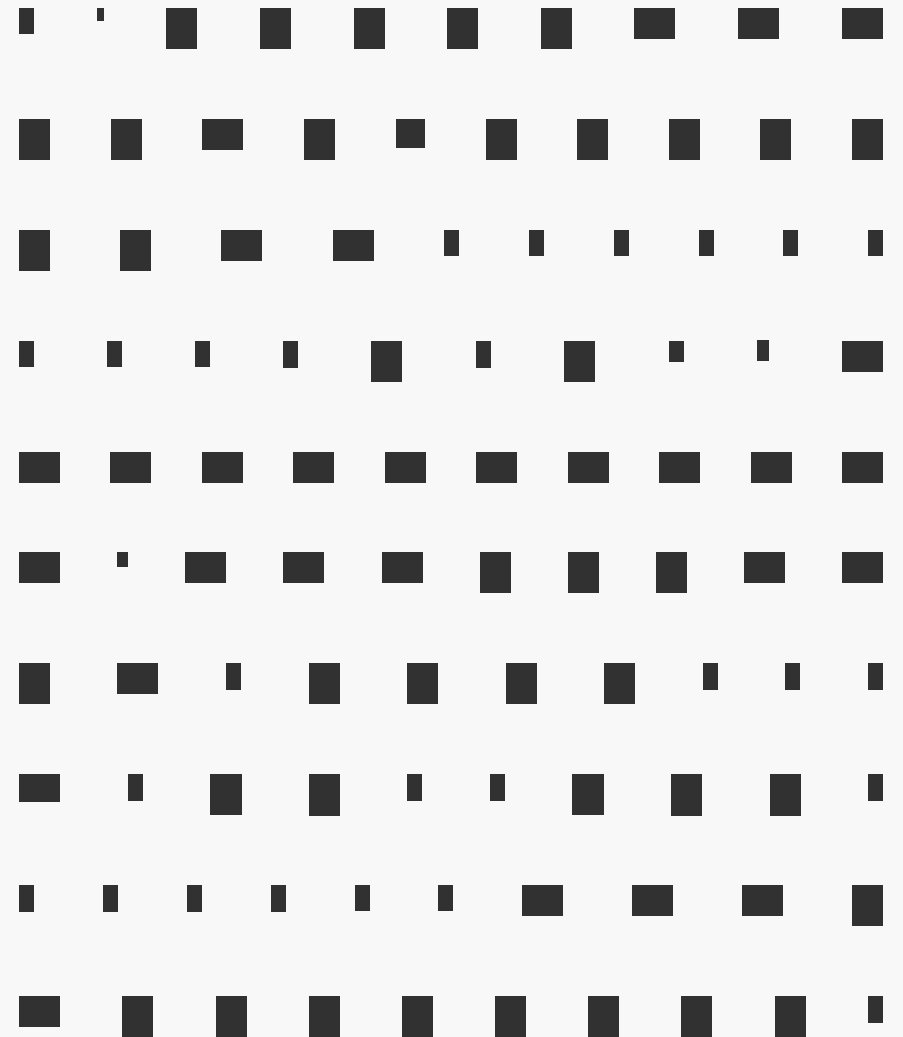

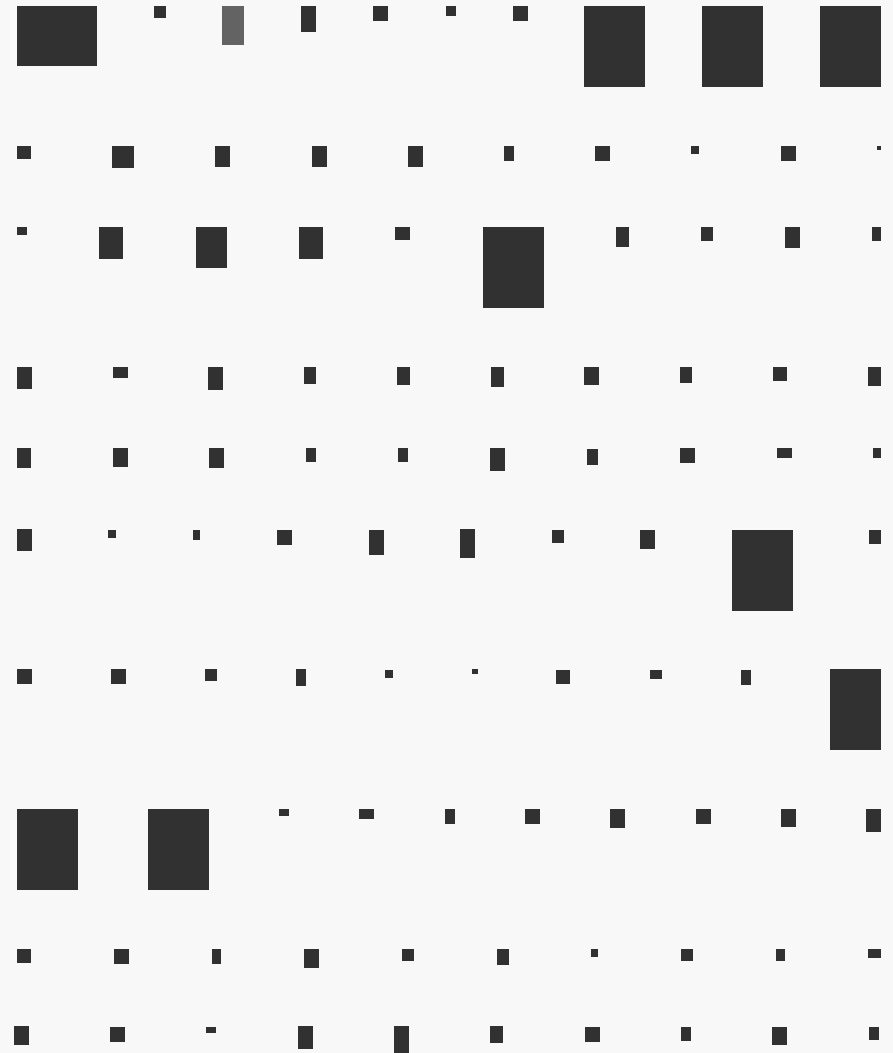

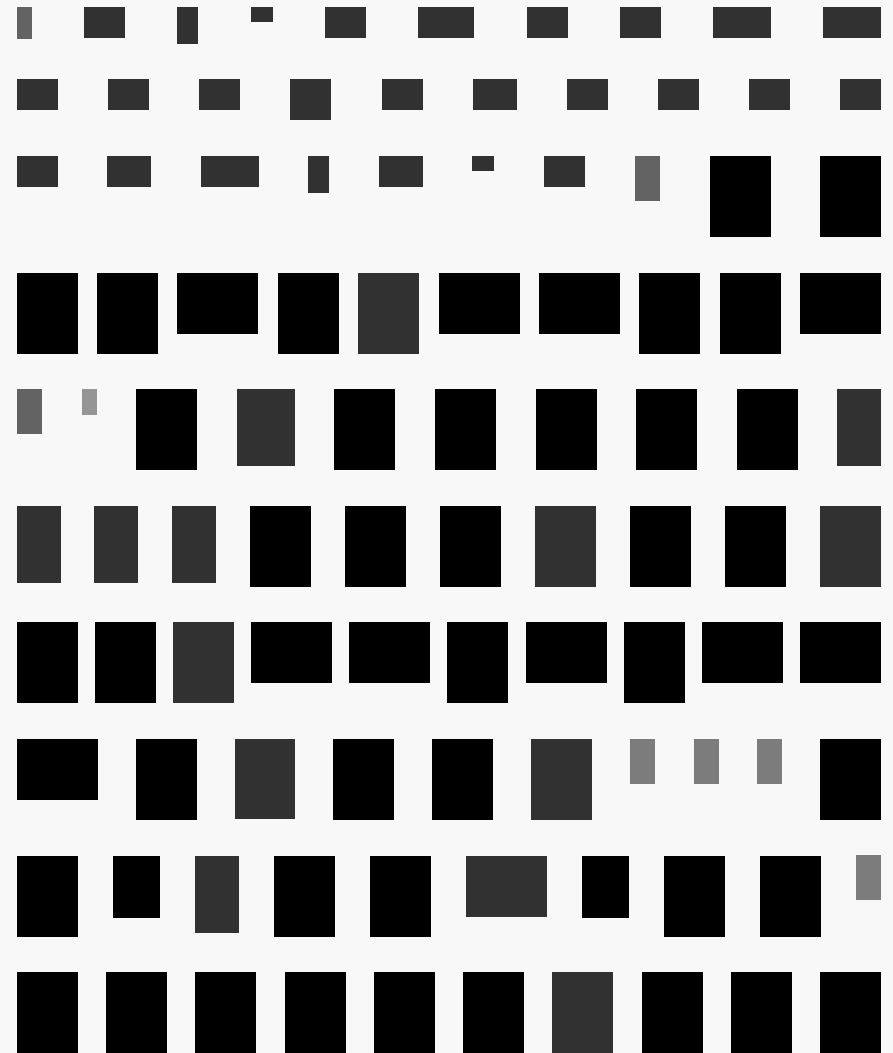


Average battery charge among the screenshots:

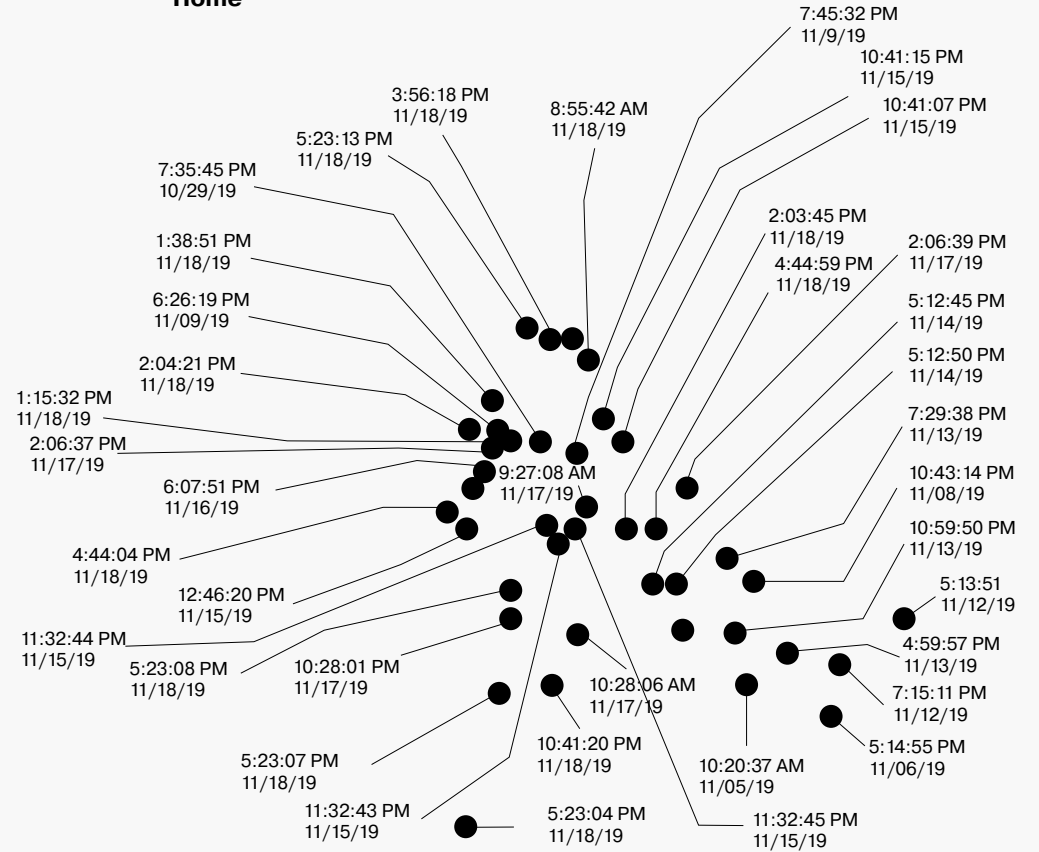

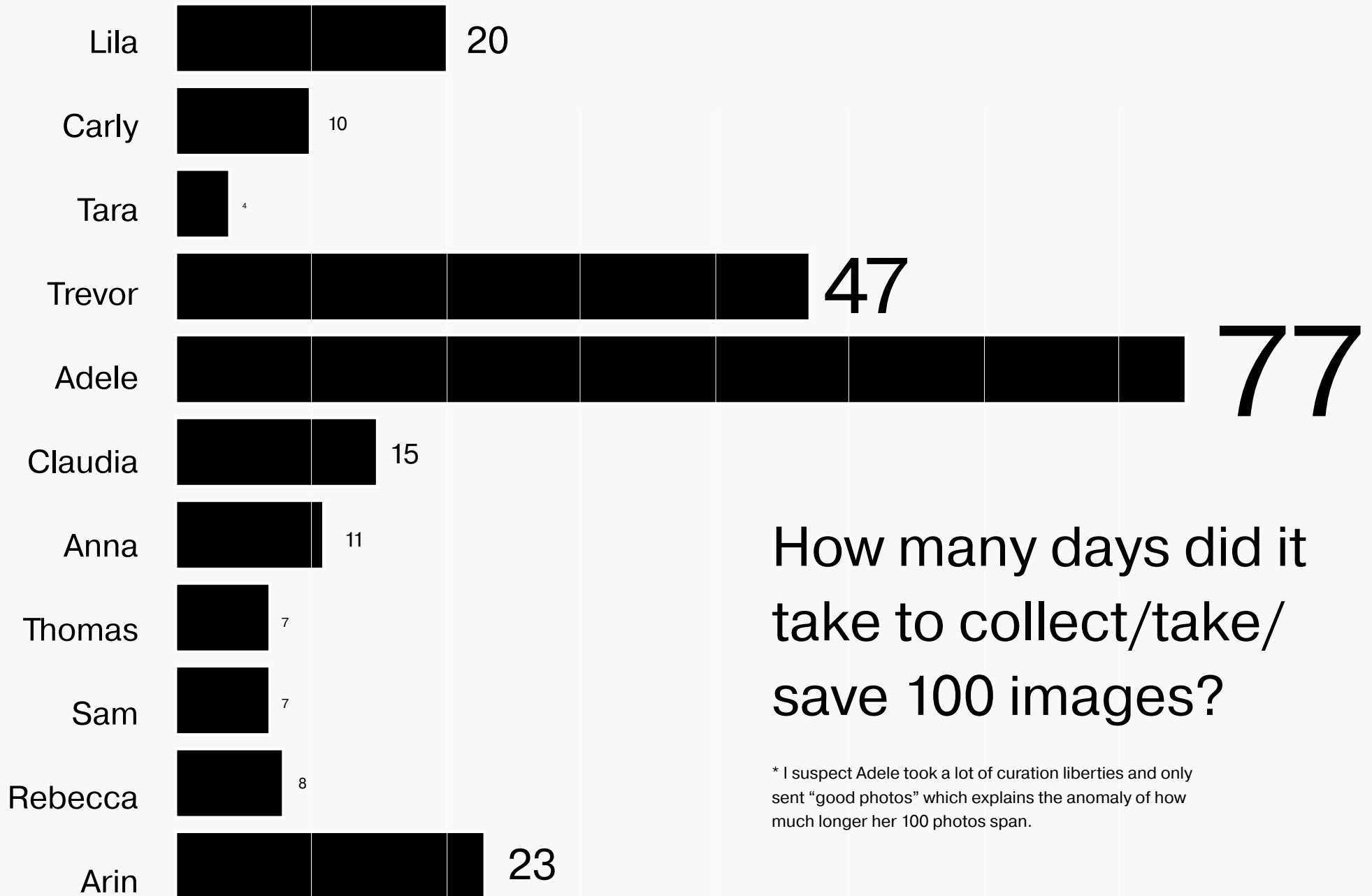

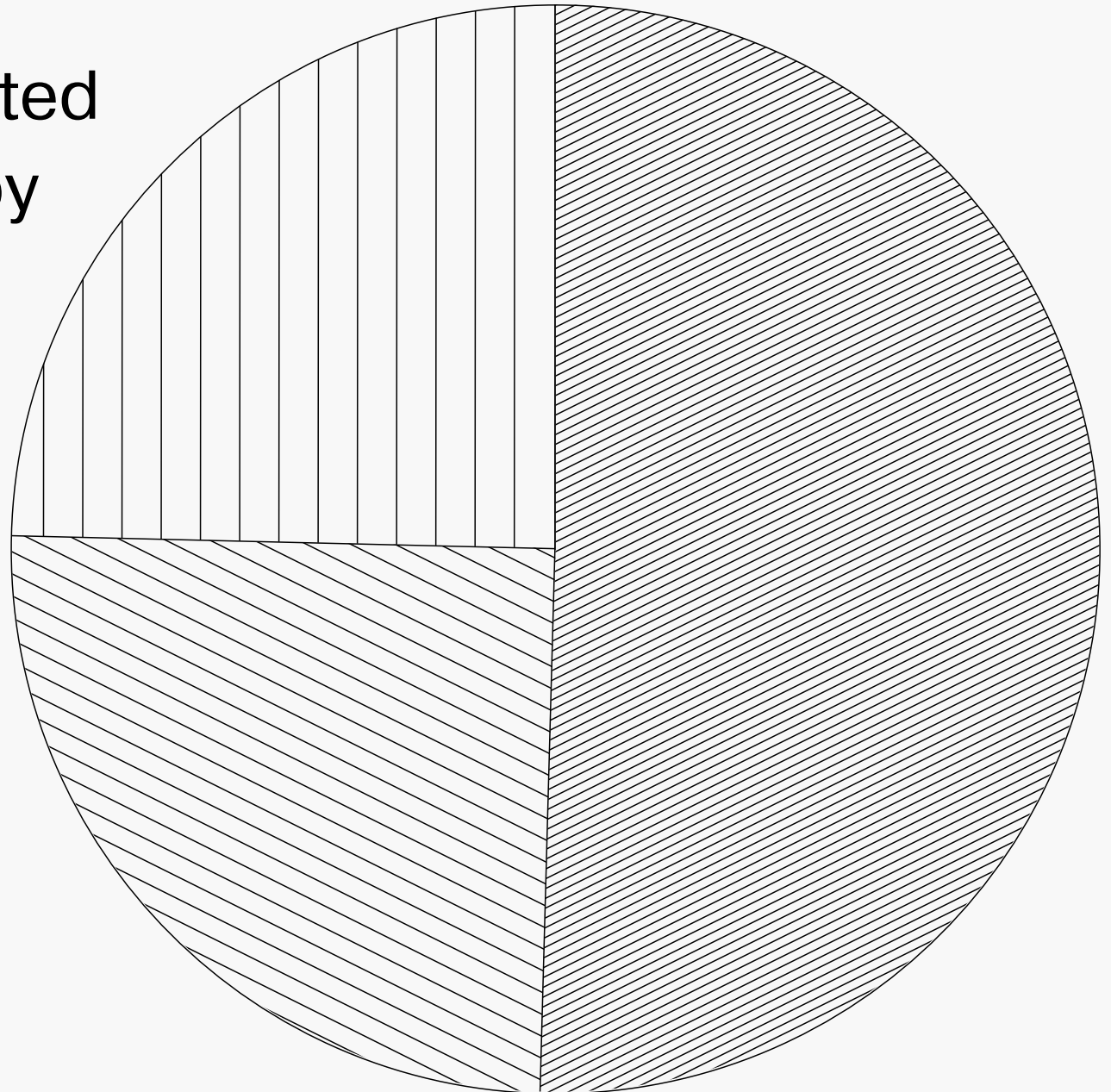
